The New Jersey Legislature meets regularly during the two-year legislative session. During the 2008-2009 Legislative Session, 4385 bills were introduced in the Assembly and 3168 were introduced in the Senate. Overall, 298 bills were enacted.

AFP-NJ selected the legislation which we had key voted and weighted some votes more heavily than others, depending upon the specific vote and how it relates to our mission and legislative priorities.

Legislative Votes

Critical Votes*

Vote 1 **A-4268/S-3095** **AFP's position: No**
This bill forces local officials to pay union wages for maintenance projects such as vehicle maintenance, tree trimming and landscaping; preventing them from saving taxpayer money by outsourcing these projects to private contractors.

Vote 2 **A-2872** **AFP's position: No**
Bill A2872 would require a 4-year degree to enter the tree trimming business. The market would be closed to capable workers simply because they are less educated. Put another way, to enter the tree trimming business one must now pass through liberal academia.

Vote 3 **S-1962** **AFP's position: Yes**
Bill S1962 changes the eligibility criteria for becoming a member and for accruing service credit as a member of the Teachers' Pension and Annuity Fund (TPAF) and of the Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS). The purpose of this bill is to preclude part-time state workers from receiving state pensions and other benefits.

Vote 4 **S-2020** **AFP's position: No**
This bill provides authority for the Department of the Treasury to allocate the State's annual bond volume limits on certain bonds in accordance with the federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (the "ARRA"). As such, bill S2020, will result in increased borrowing and more debt for this state.

Vote 5 **S-2044** **AFP's position: No**
Early buyouts have always come back as a high cost to taxpayers. This bill repeats the failures of the past while lining the pockets of high paid government workers.

Vote 6 **S-2577** **AFP's position: No**
This bill undermines the authority of local zoning boards, giving builders the power to flip from construction of adult/senior living to low income housing without the board's consent. In sum, a classic bait and switch.

Vote 7 **A-3901** **AFP's position: No**
Subject to voter approval, this bill authorized the issuance of \$600M in State general obligation bonds for acquiring and developing lands for recreation and conservation purposes, preserving farmland, and funding historic preservation projects and "Blue Acres" projects. However, much of this borrowed money dedicated to open space has been shown to be misused on projects like parking lots and astrotrurf fields.

Vote 8 **A-873** **AFP's position: No**
The Paid Family Leave Act puts another strain on business. Also increasing taxes on New Jersey's workers, the bill allows up to 6 weeks paid leave for virtually every reason, from having a baby to taking care of sick family members. A program perfectly suited for government workers.

Vote 9 **A-500** **AFP's position: No**
Bill A500 expands rules and regulations for government mandated affordable housing.

Vote 10 **A-2873** **AFP's position: No**
This bill raises the bonding limit by \$2.5B for the Economic Development Authority to fund school facilities projects primarily in SDA (formerly Abbott) districts. This additional borrowing just adds to that state's \$40B-plus debt.

Vote 11 **A-3374** **AFP's position: No**
Bill A3374 adds another \$22.5M in state spending on welfare programs and to provide free legal services to low-income residents struggling to keep their homes.

Vote 12 **AFP's position: No**
Senate approval of Justice Albin lifetime tenure. Justice Albin's record on the bench has been consistently anti-taxpayer. A vote for Albin's lifetime tenure was scored accordingly.

Vote 13 **A-4293** **AFP's position: No**
In 2008, Governor Corzine pushed large utility rate hikes through the Board of Public Utilities allegedly to fund "green" projects. This bill extends prevailing wage requirements to workers who work on these projects. As a result, more of this revenue will be used to line the pockets of Big Labor and less will be available for the "green" initiatives New Jersey taxpayers were promised.

Vote 14 **A-4261/S-3071** **AFP's position: No**
Amends the definition of the definition of "managerial executives" in the "New Jersey Employer-Employee Relations Act," in effect allowing the entire Attorney General's Office to unionize and collectively bargain with the state.

Vote 15 **A-4262/S-3078** **AFP's position: No**
A pro-union bill that allows "registered family care providers" to collectively bargain with the state.

Vote 16 **A-4263/S-3080** **AFP's position: No**
Another pro-union bill that allows "community care residential providers" to collectively bargain with the state.

Vote 17 **A-2873** **AFP's position: No**
A vote on a Motion to Table an amendment to bill A-2873. Bill A-2873 proposed raising the bonding limit for school facilities projects funded by the EDA by \$2.5B. The amendment proposed putting the question to voters. In this case, a no vote was the desired action.

Vote 18 **S-1702** **AFP's position: No**
Bill S2519 allows certain casino employees to unionize; another payoff to labor union bosses.

Vote 19 **S-445** **AFP's position: No**
A Motion to Table to prevent a vote on the "Transparency in Government Act."

Vote 20 **SCR39** **AFP's position: No**
A vote on a Motion to Table an amendment to a proposed constitutional amendment. The constitutional amendment proposed the requirement of voter approval on certain state borrowing. The amendment included language that would have further restricted state borrowing. In this case, a no vote was the desired action.

Vote 21 **S-15** **AFP's position: No**
Bill S15 redistributes more wealth from suburban and rural schools to New Jersey's failed inner city schools, which are already the most expensive school districts in the nation.

Vote 22 **A-3095** **AFP's position: No**
A3095 permits a municipality containing a Health Enterprise Zone, or contiguous with three such municipalities, to grant property tax exemption to acute care hospitals. By exempting these hospitals, revenue would need to be recovered by raising property taxes on New Jersey home owners.

Vote 23 **A-2800** **AFP's position: No**
Vote on the 2008-2009 State Budget

Vote 24 **A-2807** **AFP's position: No**
The bill freezes transitional energy facility assessment (TEFA) unit rate surcharges at calendar year 2008 rates for 2009, 2010, and 2011, and then reduce those surcharges in calendar years 2012 and 2013. By delaying the phase-out of this surcharge, New Jersey residents will be paying more in energy bills for the next few years than they otherwise would have.

Vote 25 **A-3101** **AFP's position: No**
Bill A3101 creates another massive entitlement program. While purporting to help the homeless, the bill is just more social engineering that will add more patronage jobs.

Vote 26 **S-1175** **AFP's position: No**
Bill S1175 will result in more spending on non-essential programs. In this case, funding for after-school programs in the former Abbott districts.

Vote 27 **S-1599** **AFP's position: No**
Bill S1599, the "Mortgage Stabilization and Relief Act", is a bailout for residents who bought a home with a sub-prime mortgage or should never have been given a mortgage in the first place.

Vote 28 **S-1604** **AFP's position: No**
Exempts certain sports and entertainment projects constructed under a redevelopment plan from property taxes. The revenue lost by this exemption would need to be recuperated from New Jersey homeowners.

Vote 29 **S-2372** **AFP's position: No**
Permits revenue received by municipality as payments in lieu of taxes to increase cap base upon which permissible increases to final appropriations are calculated under local cap law. This bill will result in more spending at the local level.

Vote 30 **S-2577** **AFP's position: No**
An addendum to S2577; requires more affordable housing units to be built in order to fill the town's COAH obligation.

Vote 31 **S-702** **AFP's position: No**
Bill S702 will hurt New Jersey businesses by creating more environmental regulations and driving up taxes and the cost of energy.

Vote 32 **S-21** **AFP's position: No**
Bill S21 compels municipalities to increase their pension contributions and increase taxes; pensions that could never be found in private sector.

Vote 33 **A-4111** **AFP's position: No**
Bill A4111 changes the definition of compensation for certain State employees for the period of July 1, 2009 through June 30, 2011. This pension boost will cost New Jersey taxpayers at least another \$8M in 2012 according to the Office of Management and Budget.

Vote 34 **A-4108** **AFP's position: No**
This bill raises taxes on group accident and health insurance premiums, increases the tax for surplus lines coverage, removes the cap on taxable premiums, and also subjects dental service corporations to the insurance premiums tax.

Vote 35 **A-4107** **AFP's position: No**
This bill directs the New Jersey Economic Development Authority to transfer up to \$22 million of unencumbered funds derived from interest earnings to the investment grant component of the authority's "InvestNJ Business Grant Program."

Vote 36 **A-4106** **AFP's position: No**
Allows for the transfer of unencumbered reserves from the New Jersey Housing and Mortgage Finance Agency to the State General Fund, and uses the funds to spend another \$12M in rental assistance.

Vote 37 **A-4105** **AFP's position: No**
Extends the 4% surcharge on corporation business tax liability. Also, eliminates a deferral on the repurchasing of debt, compelling businesses to report this taxable income in the current year. This bill worsens the state's poor business climate.

Vote 38 **A-4104** **AFP's position: No**
This bill increases the alcoholic beverage tax rate on liquor, wines, vermouth and sparkling wines by 25%. The tax rate on liquor is increased from \$4.40 a gallon to \$5.50 a gallon and on wines, vermouth and sparkling wines from \$0.70 a gallon to \$0.875 a gallon. The rate on certain hard cider is increased from \$0.12 a gallon to \$0.15 a gallon.

Vote 39 **A-4103** **AFP's position: No**
This bill increases the cigarette tax rate by 12.5 cents per pack of 20 cigarettes effective July 1, 2009. Presently, the State excise tax on cigarettes is \$0.12875 per cigarette, or \$2.575 per pack. This bill raises the tax to \$0.135 per cigarette, or \$2.70 per pack.

Vote 40 **A-4102** **AFP's position: No**
This bill provides a temporary increase to the rate of the gross income tax for taxpayers with taxable incomes exceeding \$400,000 in taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 2009 but before January 1, 2010. It also suspends the property tax reduction for homeowners with a gross income of over \$150,000. Given the continuing budget problems, the temporary income tax hike is likely to be extended if not made permanent.

Vote 41 **A-4101** **AFP's position: No**
Bill A4101 is a supplemental spending bill with a \$20M price tag. The monies are distributed to various governmental departments including the Department of Environmental Protection, Department of Treasury and Department of State.

Vote 42 **A-4048** **AFP's position: No**
Bill A4048 appropriates another \$15M for more government social engineering. Among the bill's provisions are grants to fund the state's affordable housing scheme.

Vote 43 **A-3521** **AFP's position: No**
Bill A3521 appropriates another \$3M for the city of Camden, continuing the flow of cash to a black hole of corruption and overspending.

Vote 44 **A-3459** **AFP's position: No**
Bill A3459 appropriates \$12,500,000 from the Long Term Obligation and Capital Expenditure Fund to the Department of Community Affairs (DCA) and the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC). In sum, more money for COAH and the Camden money pit.

Vote 45 **A-3377** **AFP's position: No**
The "Mainstreet Business Assistance Program" - Provides \$50M in loans and guarantees to small and mid-size businesses and not-for-profit corporations on an expedited basis. This program adds millions in more spending in a misguided effort to stimulate the economy.

Vote 46 **A-3372** **AFP's position: No**
This bill requires the Board of Public Utilities to adopt regulations providing that the prevailing wage rate determined by the Commissioner of Labor and Workforce be paid by contractors working on certain BPU funded projects.

Vote 47 **A-3343** **AFP's position: No**
Bill A3343 forces television manufacturers to subsidize a recycling program with a \$5000 registration fee and subjects them to a number of regulations. As of now, the taxes are being collected but there's no program in place.

Vote 48 **A-3294** **AFP's position: No**
Bill A3294 gives preferential treatment to inner-city and minority owned businesses through the InvestNJ Business Grant Program.

Vote 49 **A-3170** **AFP's position: No**
Assembly Bill No. 3170 makes permanent the \$2 surcharge on traffic tickets dedicated to the State's DNA laboratory and the analysis of DNA for criminal and other forensic purposes. This surcharge is in effect for the five years immediately following the effective date of the law.

Vote 50 **A-2623** **AFP's position: No**
This bill expands the Neighborhood Revitalization Tax Credit Program by providing \$10M in tax credits to neighborhoods adjacent to those that currently qualify.

Vote 51 **A-2589** **AFP's position: No**
This bill authorizes the EDA to provide appropriate assistance, including but not limited to, extensions of credit, loans, and guarantees, to eligible municipalities, their agencies and instrumentalities, in order to facilitate the financing and development of parking structures in such municipalities.

Vote 52 **A-4100** **AFP's position: No**
Vote on the 2009-2010 Budget

Vote 53 **A-2544** **AFP's position: No**
Allows for the construction of an aquarium within the confines of the Meadowlands Complex. This includes the authority to enter any agreements it deems necessary for the construction of the aquarium, the acquisition of any land that may be needed for its construction, and the ownership, costs and operation thereof for a non-essential project.

Vote 54 **S-1557** **AFP's position: No**
Bill S1557 expands the NJ FamilyCare program, mandating coverage for all children 18 and younger and making other changes to the insurance market. This legislation is an incremental step towards socialized medicine under the guise of "universal coverage."
